Dear Hope Igniter,

Hope Ignited was established as a 501(c)(3) in Tyler, TX in 2002 with a mission to bring the hope of Jesus Christ to the people of Guinea, West Africa by empowering local leaders to transform their own communities. Since that time, God has guided our work, opened doors, and provided key relationships that culminated in His calling on us to build the country's first pediatric center of excellence called Sacré Coeur – a center that now faithfully provides high-level, compassionate care to over 15,000 children per year as a service of the global church. As 2025 comes to a close, we wanted to share with you some of our most pressing needs, each of which are critical for the continuation of our work of making the good news of Jesus Christ known to the people of Guinea.

Daouda is a 10 year old boy who first came to see us two years ago. He had swollen legs, a big belly, and was emaciated from months of sickness that went undiagnosed and mismanaged in other hospitals. His grandmother had nothing left and felt hopeless when she came to Sacré Coeur for the first time. Through the church's generosity fund, we were able to do all necessary tests to diagnose his heart disease and our specialty clinic is now providing close follow up to ensure his medications are appropriately titrated to keep him at his best. He is now back in school and even starting to play soccer again! And because of the generosity and compassion shown by our staff and the church, Daouda's grandmother decided to dedicate him to the church so that he would grow up inside the community that cared so deeply for him when nobody else could or would.

Our aim is to be more than a pediatric center. We are looking to be a space of hope and healing to the children and families of Guinea – a space that provides people with a glimpse of God's coming kingdom in the midst of an extremely poor and dark context. Your support helps the countless number of children like Daouda receive the care they need, and more than that, encounter the love of Christ through the compassionate care of his church.

We thank you in advance for your willingness to join us in support of our mission in country. May God bless our combined efforts to be a sign and foretaste of His coming kingdom around the world.

Anticipate (Resurrection)

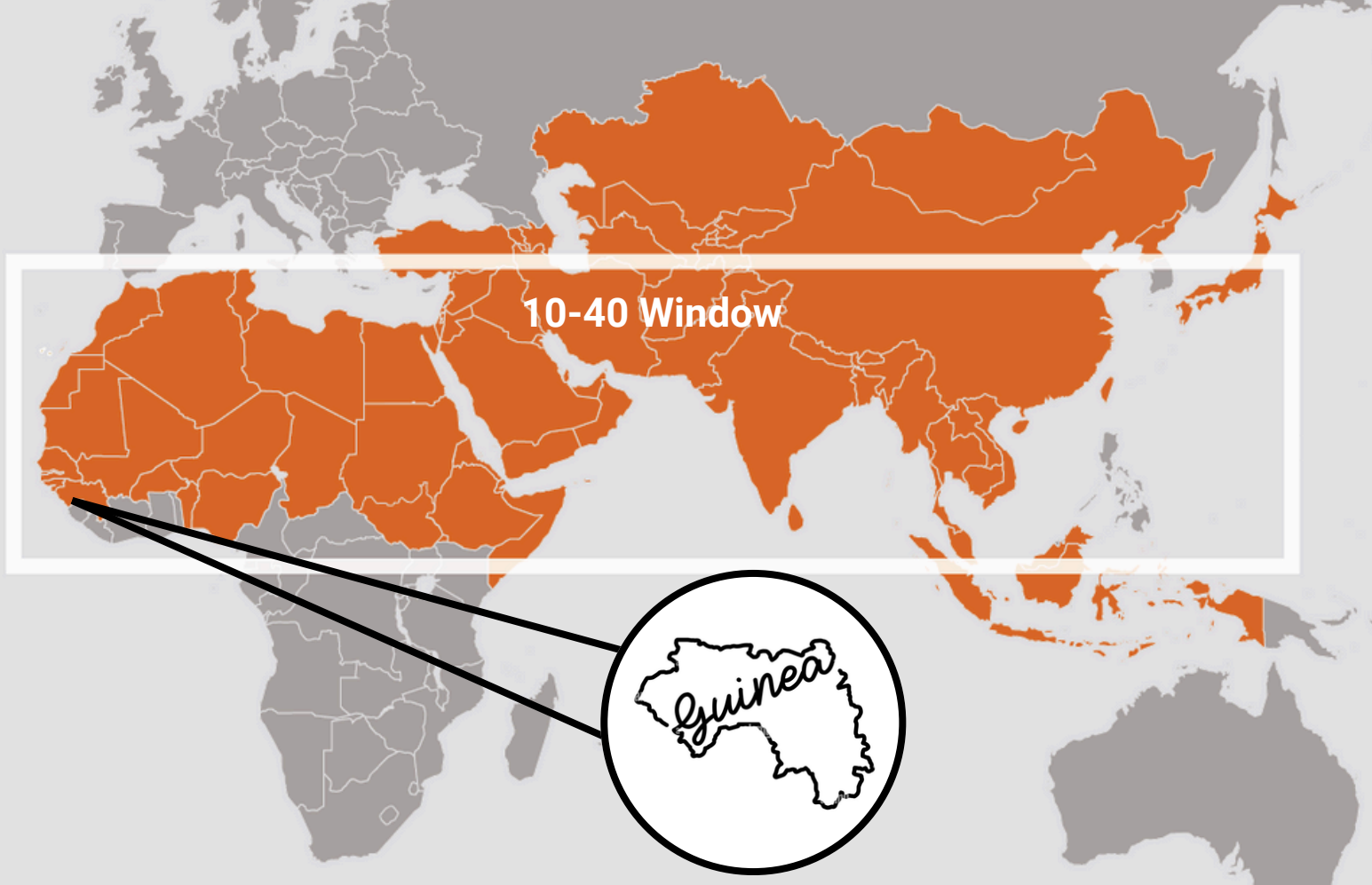
HOPE, standing on resurrection ground, anticipates the world to come by working to align the present with God's coming future.

Why Guinea?

Located within the 10-40 window, Guinea is home to 14 million people, 95% of whom profess a Muslim faith. Over 20 years ago, God providentially called the founders of Hope Ignited to live and work amongst the Guinean people to provide a spark of hope and healing in this very dark place.

Why Pediatric Healthcare?

Amongst the 14 million people living in Guinea, over half the population is under the age of 15 years. This means there are over 8 million children living in Guinea. Studies have shown that 85% of people who make a decision to follow Christ do so between the ages of 4-14 years - the so-called 4-14 window, a demographic equivalent to the 10-40 window.

Serving children through Christ-centered ministries in a country where 95% of the population is Muslim and over 50% are under the age of 18 years is of paramount importance for the work of the Kingdom in Africa.

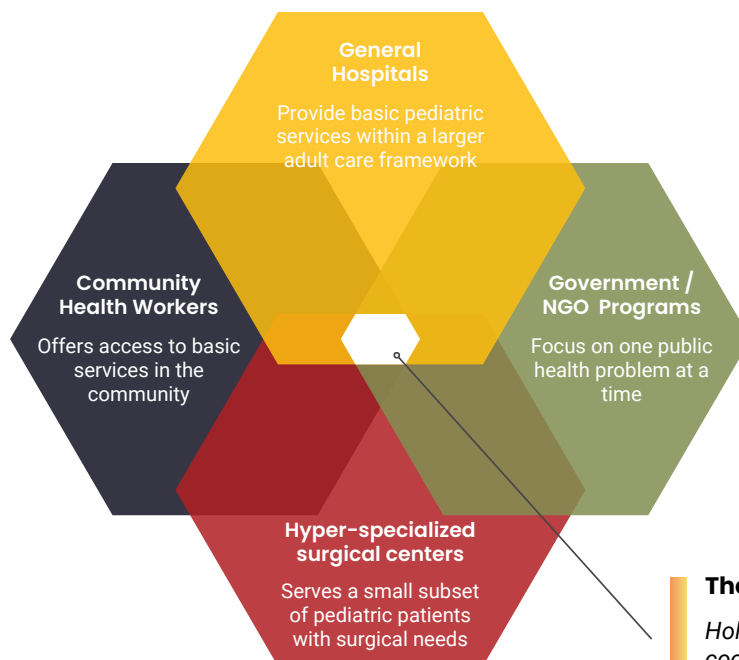


Value placed on elders, not children

The Need : Pediatric Healthcare

Given the lack of priority placed on children, it comes as no surprise that pediatric healthcare is lacking in Guinea. There are fewer than 25 pediatricians in the entire country, no pediatric hospitals and no pediatric residency programs, creating an ever-growing shortage of pediatric care. In addition, the traditional approaches to global health have created a siloed, fragmented system that is all but impossible for poor families to navigate. This results in terrible outcomes for kids - over 25% of children are malnourished and the under 5 year and infant mortality rates are in the bottom 10% in the world.

Holistic approach and coordination of care across all domains

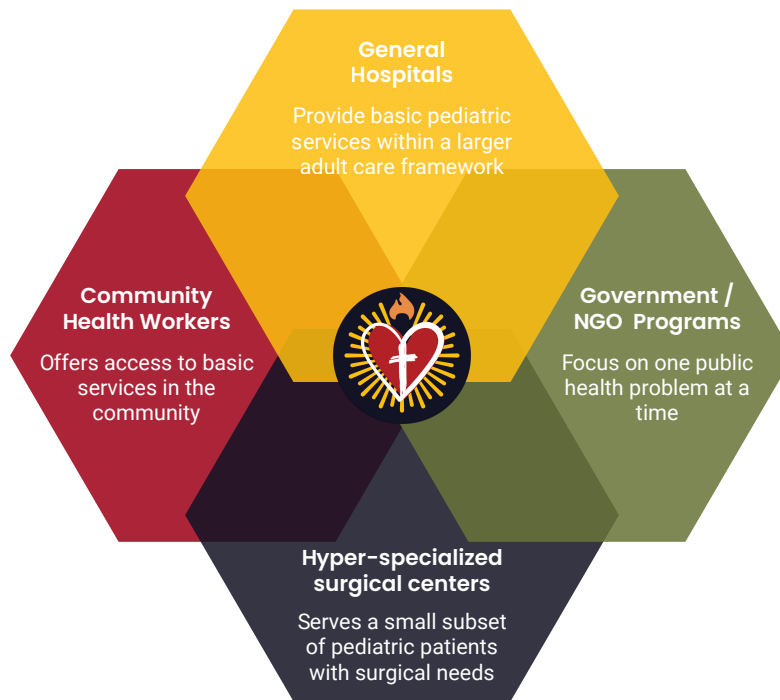
The Need : Kingdom Development

Despite the church being present in Guinea for over 300 years, there has been relatively little breakthrough of the gospel. While the reasons for this are multifaceted, one major influence has been the individualized and dualistic understanding of the gospel that has led to a minimization of the church's role in community transformation. Jeremiah's prophetic word for the pilgrim people of God to seek the welfare of their city has been replaced with a model that focuses exclusively on the saving of the individual soul. Given the communal nature of the Guinean people where individuals lack the autonomy to make a personal decision that runs counter to their family tradition, a more holistic approach to evangelism and church development is needed.

In addition, the majority of Guineans tend to still view the gospel as a foreign story that belongs to a foreign people, one that is completely removed from their own understanding of their community and their lives. The goal is for the church to live out the love of Christ in embodied ways so as to make the work of the church central to the life of a community.

Communities need to grow up knowing that the gospel is not simply a foreign story, but rather one that is central to their lived lives. When they were sick, it was the church that cared for them; when they were in need of counsel, it was the church that guided them; when the community was in need, it was the church that became a blessing to them. It is in these actions of faith, love and hope that the story of the gospel becomes tangible, real and fully intertwined in people's personal story. This isn't a minimization of the proclamation of the word, but rather putting flesh onto the word by showing up to do life with a specific people in a specific place.

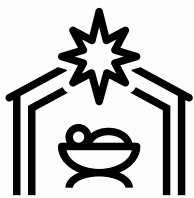




Holistically Responding to the Need

Given these needs, something new was needed. Sacré Coeur was created to fill the gap in pediatric healthcare to provide excellent care to children and train local medical professionals while serving as an embodied witness to the gospel of Jesus Christ - a spark of HOPE and healing in a very dark place.

As we strive for excellence in medicine, we do so by following the trajectory of Jesus' life so that in every patient encounter and within our community, we proclaim the good news of Jesus in word and deed.



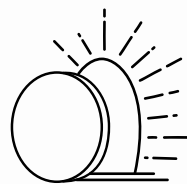

IDA Pharmacy Order :

Every year, we make two large orders from IDA Foundation in order to supply our pharmacy with high quality medications. IDA Foundation is a non-profit business that manufactures quality medications at a fair price, allowing Sacré Coeur to provide our patients with quality-assured medications at a price that is accessible even to the poorest among us. Our orders are placed every June and December, totalling around \$25,000 per order.

Container :

While we strive to purchase as many medical supplies in country to create a sustainable model, Guinea is not yet able to fully support our inventory needs at a fair price. We therefore rely on donations and purchased equipment / consumables from the U.S. and Europe to fulfill our needs. We ship a container full of medical supplies and donated items each fall to ensure we have everything needed to continue offering excellent care to the children of Guinea. The bulk of the items included in the container are donated, but it costs around \$15,000 to pack the container and pay for shipping / customs.

New Vehicle :

We have two new families joining us full-time in 2026 to help at the Pediatric Center. To accommodate the growth of our international team in Guinea, and to ensure there are enough vehicles to support the needs of those serving at the center, we have a goal of adding a new car to our fleet. This vehicle will be purchased through Toyota Gibraltar which manufactures rugged vehicles specifically for non-profit organizations who work in areas where paved roads are not always available.

Generosity Fund :

At Sacré Coeur Pediatric Center, it is our goal to provide care to every patient that walks through the door, regardless of their ability to pay. Our cost of care is so low that 90% of patients have the ability to pay in full, but for numerous reasons, there are always those who cannot. The Generosity Fund is the church's response to this need and the Scriptural mandate (Matthew 25) to look after those who are sick.

Monthly Donors :

Monthly donors are the lifeblood of our organization and a key factor in helping us efficiently, effectively and compassionately care for children in Guinea. These funds could be used to support operations, provide direct care or support further training for staff and interns.



Pediatric Training :

“Turning Over”—raising up local leaders—is central to our mission. Our Guinean physicians have grown significantly since the center’s opening, but there is still much more to learn. Through one-on-one bedside training, international conferences, diploma programs, research opportunities, and the investment of visiting specialists, our local staff are steadily building capacity. Today:

- Four Guinean physicians see the majority of general pediatric patients independently.
- One Guinean physician leads our sickle cell program after completing intensive training in Senegal.
- Another has developed capacity in pediatric cardiology, including consultations and basic echocardiograms.
- All of our local physicians have trained in the emergency department, strengthening their ability to care for the sickest children.

The results are clear - training and investment in local physicians multiplies impact for years to come. The requested funding will be used to send motivated Christian physicians to Senegal to complete a 4-year pediatric residency program, after which they will return to Sacré Coeur to become a full-time part of our staff to further increase our capacity to care for children well and to train local colleagues to do the same. The selected physicians will have already completed a minimum of one year of training in our center before going to Senegal, ensuring they are ready for the challenge. Our goal is to send at least one physician per year over the next 5 years so that we create a pipeline of human resources as we look to build the country’s first pediatric hospital in the future.

Chaplain / Pastoral Training :

Raising up Biblically strong church leaders who have a longing to make the good news of Jesus Christ known throughout Guinea is of paramount importance. Despite the Spirit moving in powerful ways to call up young leaders, training opportunities for French-speaking pastors is extremely limited. Additionally, the training that is available often lacks a practical focus on how leaders can come alongside patients and families that are suffering due to illness.

Our goal for pastoral / chaplaincy training programs is two-fold:

- Develop biblical literacy and practical capacity in praying with and coming alongside the sick through prayer, management of the generosity fund, and leadership of church services.
- Develop leaders' capable of planting new churches alongside pediatric centers throughout the main regions of Guinea so that the model of Sacré Coeur can be duplicated in all regions of the country.

By following the model of Jesus - healing, teaching and preaching - our new church plant has grown to 75-100 members attending each Sunday. We are confident that the reason we are already seeing the fruit of the Kingdom is because of our approach of pairing holistic healing as an embodied witness of the gospel with strong church leadership in our on-site church plant. We want to ensure that as we train up local pediatric providers to start new clinics throughout Guinea, we are also equipping church leaders that are capable of planting churches with strong, Biblical foundations.
